### LMBR

Metella Road Public School will transition to the new NSW public schools' finance system and a new bank account on **5 September 2016.** 

To ensure a smooth transition, there will be changes to the way we accept parent or carer payments.

- Direct deposits: As of 31 August 2016, we will no longer accept direct deposits into our current school bank account as we prepare to close this account and transition to the new one. Any payments made using direct deposit after this date cannot be properly allocated to a student's account in a timely manner. Please ensure you have made any outstanding direct deposits before 31 August 2016.
- EFTPOS payments: We will not be able to accept EFTPOS payments between 29 August and 5 September 2016. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding EFTPOS payments before 29 August 2016. From 6 September 2016, EFTPOS payments will be accepted as before.
- Cash and cheque payments: Between 31 August 2016 and 5 September 2016, we will also not be able to accept payments by cash or cheque as we prepare to close our current bank account and transition to the new one. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding cash or cheque payments before 31 August 2016. From 6 September 2016, cash and cheque payments will be accepted as before.
- 4. Online payments: Between 27 August 2016 and 4 September 2016, we will also not be able to accept online payments as we prepare to close our current bank account and transition to the new one. Please ensure that you have made any outstanding online payments before 27 August 2016. From 5 September 2016, online payments will be accepted as before.

### An Interesting Read:

# The Key Role Grandparents Play "Leave me alone!"

One of the best things children can have in their lives is a grandparent. We have always known the importance of grandparents and that special bond that they share with their grandchildren but now research has shown how crucial grandparents can be.

A study which examined the role grandparents play in the development of children, confirmed that grandparents are key to grandchildren's happiness!

The results found the emotional relationship between grandparents and their grandchildren can significantly affect the children's academic, psychological, and social development. When grandparents are involved in their grandchildren's lives, children are not only more social but also more engaged in school.

Researchers also noted children were more likely to develop skills essential for social development, such as showing care, compassion and kindness for people who are not part of their inner circles.

The strong grandparent-grandchild connection was found regardless of income or whether it was a single parent or two parent households. In fact, grandparents who do not live with their grandchildren were found to have the strongest bond. That may be because non-resident grandparents take on a role that encourages positive development rather than disciplining negative behaviour, particularly important in earlyadolescence when parent-child conflict increases. Grandchildren can find secure allies in grandparents. If there is a problem, they come in and help out.

The study concluded that children have a higher level of self-confidence when grandparents give more affection. Such emotional closeness has long-term positive impacts on children's lives, including the value children derive from giving and receiving care from another person.

### **Kindergarten News**

Wow, I cannot believe it is almost the end of Term 2. We have had a productive term and the students have continued to learn many new and exciting things.

The students in Kindergarten have continued to improve their literacy skills through the implementation of our Language, Learning and Literacy program (L3).

The students have been involved in a range of reading and writing activities through the use of small group situations. During these







group activities they have the opportunity to learn a range of skills including reading and comprehending simple texts, learning sounds, using their knowledge of sounds to record unknown words, reading and recording sight words and writing sentences.

L3 is taught in our classrooms to small groups of students as part of the daily literacy lesson. While the teacher is working with a small group of students in the

'engine room', the remainder of the class participate in carefully selected individual or group literacy learning tasks.

The L3 program is successful in achieving improved literacy outcomes for our Kindergarten students as well as providing an engaging and enjoyable way for the students to become successful readers and writers.

### Stage 1 News

Our Stage 1 students enjoyed having their grandparents visit their classroom last week for Grandparent's Day. They were able to show their grandparents their beautiful work and some even were able to play on the backfield with them at recess.

Our Stage 1 teachers have been busy writing our Semester 1 reports and are excited about sharing the progress and achievement of their students.

In English, students are continuing exploring the theme of journeys that authors' weave throughout their stories. Sometimes the main character undergoes a personal journey where they transform and change throughout the story. Students presented their speeches for our Oracy Competition. So many students presented engaging and informative speeches. We were so proud of them. Our stage winner was announced at our stage assembly and a big congratulations goes to Sahana from 2F!

In Mathematics, students have been learning how to make equal groups and share items equally. These concepts form the foundation of multiplication and division. Students are doing an amazing job, finding out the total number of items, and solving how many equal groups are made. They are also learning all about the months of the year, how many days in a month and how to tell the time on a digital and analogue clock. Students have been enjoying conducting hands-on investigations about the mass of various items. They have been hefting and using equal arm balances to help them with their enquiries.

In Human Society and its Environment (H.S.I.E) students are continuing to learn all about transport. They are examining the different features of transport networks and why we need these features. We are exploring the advantages and disadvantages of transport. Students are finding this unit of work very engaging!

In Science, students are busy conducting various experiments. It is wonderful to see their curiosity stirred as they devise ways to test their hypothesis. Students in Year 1 are learning about how mixtures can be created and then separated. Our Year 2



students are conducting observations to learn more about the lifecycle of a mealworm.

Stage 1 have also been involved in playing structured soccer matches during recess on the K-2 field. This has proved to be an excellent way to help our students learn to play fairly and cooperatively with one another. A number of Year 5 students have happily volunteered to referee these matches and we are very grateful for their efforts.

We are so proud of our Stage 1 students and commend them for their amazing efforts. Our students continually Aim High! Well done Year 1 and Year 2!

### Stage 2 News

The students in Stage 2 have continued to have a busy and constructive term.

With our visual literacy unit in full swing, the students have learnt a large number of visual literacy terms and techniques used in visual imagery. In Mathematics the students have been learning various multiplication and division strategies as well as fractions. In the strand of Measurement, we are learning all about volume and capacity and mass. The students are enjoying all the concrete materials and equipment that are used when exploring these strands.

During our History unit we have been delving deep and researching what Aboriginal culture was like before British Colonisation. The students have been enjoying researching certain aspects and sharing their thoughts and conclusions with their peers and teachers.

On Tuesday, Week 6, we were privileged to open our classrooms to all our grandparents. The students thoroughly enjoyed sharing their bookwork and completing activities with their grandparents.

In Mathematics, thirty students from Year 6 have been participating in Maths Olympiad challenges. These challenges aim to introduce students to important mathematical concepts



and teach major strategies to develop flexibility in problem solving.

Year 6 Fundraising is going extremely well. Our next Year 6 Fundraising event is our Walkathon Sausage Sizzle on Thursday 23 June. All orders for the sausage sizzle must be pre-ordered and forms must be returned to the office by Tuesday 14 June.
