However, there is always scope for improvement and our staff will continue to work with our students to maximise their learning potential and improve student learning outcomes.



Extra-Curricular Activities

Our school vision "to become a centre of excellence, challenging children of all abilities to attain their highest level of achievement in academic, cultural and sporting pursuits" has been taken to a new level this term with the introduction of a school band and the Fun Do Kids STEM

challenge.

Fun Do Kids commenced at the school in Week 1 with a free trial class. This program, for students from Years 2 to 6, uses Lego Education to expose students to the principles of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics through exploring and building models making use of basic mechanisms such as gears, pulleys, wheels, axels and inclined planes. The program is run in 6D's classroom from 3:15pm-4:45pm on Tuesday afternoons.

School Band is coming! This coming Thursday, Cool Kids Music will commence band and band tutorials in the School Hall from 1:00pm. We are very excited by the program and are looking forward to seeing our school band develop and perform over the year.

As part of our STEM Challenge with Fun Do Kids we were very fortunate to have the NSW Fire Brigade visit our school to talk to our students. A very special thanks to Andrew Low, Station Officer, Seven Hills B Platoon and his team for taking the time to discuss bush fires and their impact on the community and the fire brigade. SOVERNMENT Education

Stage 1 News

Our students in Stage 1 have had a great start to Term 2. They have all returned rejuvenated and ready to aim high and challenge themselves to reach their learning goals.

This term, in English, we are exploring the concept of Journeys. Using lots of quality texts in modelled reading, students are investigating the different journeys that many characters go through, focusing on the literary devices that authors use to show change and growth. In writing, students are composing texts for a variety of purposes, aiming to entertain, persuade or inform their readers on a range of topics. In speaking and listening, students are encouraged to express their point of view on the topic of Journeys, engaging in both formal and informal presentations about memorable journeys or changes they have personally experienced.

In Mathematics, students have been building and developing their number sense. They have been looking at how numbers are made up of hundreds, tens and ones, and using this knowledge when dealing with money. Our students have been learning lots of different addition and subtraction strategies, finding the most efficient way to add and subtract. They have also been learning all about the different seasons, months and dates. Students have thoroughly enjoyed learning all about gathering information and recording the data as tally marks or as a picture graph.

This term in Geography, we are learning about "Aboriginal Connections". We have been busy mapping the land that belonged to the Dharug nation, on which our school is situated on. Students are learning all about Dreamtime stories and the importance of land and country.

In Science and Technology, Year 1 are learning about the chemical changes that food can undergo by being heated or cooled, in the unit "Spot the Difference". Year 2 are learning all about animals that can be found in and around the school, in the unit "Schoolyard Safari". They have been having a wonderful time looking at lots of creepy crawlies that are found at our school!

In Personal Development and Health, students are learning all about growth and change, as well as participating in antibullying lessons. These lessons are incredibly valuable and students are learning so much through role play and peer discussions.

During this term and next term, the school will be providing parents with the opportunity to attend parent workshops. Some of these workshops will be looking specifically at learning in the early years – please stay tuned for the dates and information.

Monday, 15 May 2017

5A – Urban Places and Cityscape Art

Last term 5A learnt about what an urban place is in Geography and the difference between an urban place and rural place. They also looked closely at the city of Sydney and observed and discussed the changes that Sydney has encountered over the years since settlement and the changes that are projected to occur over the next ten to twenty years as Sydney's population continues to grow.

We then created a cityscape artwork of Sydney. The students were provided with an image of Sydney and they had to use lines to create it. They then experimented with water colours to create the sky in the background. We discussed how to create warm and cool colours. The students decided they wanted a sunset in the background and this required warm colours and a blending technique to achieve a sunset.

5T - Maths

5T have been working hard during Mathematics lessons.

We have been learning how to tell the time accurately using 24-hour time. 5T create 24-hour clocks as a learning resource for the classroom.

We also learnt about time zones across the world and in Australia. 5T had fun testing their Geography skills finding Australian cities in different states and calculating their current time.

We created posters for our classroom to teach others all about time!
